

Why were the Brooke online resources developed?

- > Equine veterinary education and evidence-based veterinary resources are limited in the countries where Brooke operates
- To overcome this lack of evidence-based knowledge the Brooke developed interactive online working equid specific resources
- Despite working in remote locations Brooke vets are part of an online community, sharing resources and experience across continents

Working Equid Vet Wiki

The Brooke Working Equid Vet Wiki is an online database that allows people to add or modify content. Brooke vets across our programmes have developed the content by editing the text and also by submitting photographs and case studies. This has been supported by technical checking and evidence-based referencing to ensure the accuracy and reliability of the information. The wiki is used as

of the information. The wiki is used as a reference for the direct treatment of working equids. It continues to evolve online and next year we aim to make this valuable resource open access.
