EMPOWERING WOMEN IN EQUINE COMMUNITIES

Brooke India addressed the importance of tackling gender inequality in agriculture and food systems at a prestigious international conference in New Delhi last October.

The Indian president Smt. Droupadi Murmu introduced the event at which Brooke India highlighted the roles and potential of horses, donkeys and mules alongside women in remote areas.

Brooke India's exhibition demonstrated how women's skills can bring transformative change to their lives. They featured handicrafts created by Women Equine Welfare groups in Kutch, Karnal and Solapur which make additional income for their families.

A day in the life of...

Diana Gladness Paravet, Tanzania



Diana enjoys sharing her passion for equine welfare with others, especially children who are the next generation of donkey owners.

Diana Gladness is a qualified paravet (assistant veterinarian) working as an education officer and welfare ambassador for Arusha Society for the Protection of Animals (ASPA) in Tanzania. She is also studying for a bachelor's degree in veterinary medicine.

Diana's love of animals started in childhood – growing up, it was her job to feed and milk six cattle. But it wasn't until she started volunteering with ASPA that she first encountered donkeys. There, through Brooke, she received training on donkey welfare including how to communicate with them, which drugs to use to treat them, and the laws and regulations surrounding donkeys.

Now, Diana is an inspirational educator to many children and adults, raising awareness of equine welfare among her local communities.

A TYPICAL WEEK

Diana's working day starts early at 5am. After getting her young son ready for school, she helps her mother feed the chickens. If it's an office day, she travels 30 minutes by bus.

Diana's role involves caring for donkeys three days a week – attending clinics to help with general health check–ups, worming and tetanus vaccinations. She also visits donkeys on market days where she educates owners on wounds, disease, parasites and eye problems.

"Sometimes we provide them with brochures on what they can do best for their donkeys. Also, we have been using a school programme. So through education, at school, through donkey care clubs, children are bringing back the message to their parents."

Diana spends the rest of the week at schools and colleges, sharing learning materials and offering training sessions so students can learn how to interact with the donkeys.

LOOKING AHEAD

As if that wasn't enough, Diana checks in with a donkey owners' group she and colleagues set up which helps owners launch small enterprise projects to enhance their livelihoods. "My hope is to see donkeys happy. Just like our motto for us: for happy animals, happy people. With freedom, love, care and protection, it will bring great success to owners and to the country."

"I've come to love donkeys because they are so calm. I came to find out donkeys are not just for transporting goods – they are also used for leading the way, like dogs." _{Diana}

HELPING EQUINES WITH HEAT STRESS

Providing comfort to working donkeys and horses was uppermost on the minds of the Brooke Ethiopia team when they constructed a community shelter.

To help combat heat stress, owners can register their animals for the shelter which provides access to feed, water and a shady stable while they go to market. It also doubles up as a training hub offering equine welfare workshops, animal health advice and basic medicine and treatments.

Previously, some horses and donkeys were kept in muddy stables which caused hoof problems – others without shelter at all, making them vulnerable to hyena attacks. Now horses and donkeys can enjoy sandy floors in an open paddock area, which encourages natural behaviours such as rolling and playing.

Engidawork Guracha is a community engagement field officer in Halaba who trained with Brooke. He told us the shelters house over 200 working donkeys and horses and have improved the animal-human relationship.



WORKING WITH GOVERNMENT FOR A SUSTAINABLE FUTURE

In 2023, Brooke Latin America and the Caribbean worked with national bodies in Nicaragua to develop a range of disaster response management initiatives. Making sure the role of working horses, donkeys and mules was properly recognised, they supported communities with their first practice of an emergency response.

Working animals' lives are positively impacted by Brooke's close work with the government in Nicaragua, thanks to your support. Working horses, donkeys and mules benefit from vets' improved understanding of the health conditions, disease risk and welfare needs specific to them. We collaborate with, and provide training to, vets through the Institute of Agricultural Protection and Health (IPSA).

As one example, IPSA set up a new mobile health clinic with Brooke's help near the main city of Managua. In one morning, 33 horses received preventative healthcare, advice and treatment. Thanks to support like yours, Brooke teams can promote equine health countrywide.

FUNDRAISING FOR WORKING EQUIDS IN Pakistan's Brick Kilns

Surrey, London and West Kent Group raised a whopping (dare way we say, clopping) £15,000 for working horses, donkeys and mules through their recent fundraising activities – and we're so grateful. From collections to tabletop sales, the group struck big and raised funds for our scaling up of welfare improvements for working equids in Pakistan's brick kilns.

Louise Brown, the group's co-leader, has been fundraising for Brooke since 2007. Living in Sudan for six years prompted her to get involved.



Louise says, "Every day, I saw horses, donkeys and mules pulling heavy and over–laden carts. When I came home to the UK, I knew this was the charity that would enable me to help those animals."

Where there's a Will there's a way to support working equines

Brooke Youth Ambassador **Hannah Russell** is an author and entrepreneur. She rose to fame at just 17 with her award-winning children's book series about her pint-sized Shetland pony, Little Alf. Hannah's life changed dramatically in 2020, aged 24, when she was diagnosed with a type of cancer called sarcoma.

Thankfully, Hannah is now in remission. And, following a trip to Kenya to see our work in action, Hannah amended her Will to Brooke to help working horses, donkeys and mules for generations to come.

A CAUSE CLOSE TO HER HEART

Hannah tells us that writing a Will aged 26 'set the foundations' of her life while supporting causes close to her heart.

She adds, "I love all animals and imagine throughout my lifetime I will have a lot of them, so it was important I think about them and make sure they are also cared for. Writing a Will, no matter my age, is the best way to ensure they will be." Hannah amended her Will using our new Free Will Service. This allows you to write your Will online, over the phone or face to face with a solicitor at no cost. It's a lasting way to remember both our loved ones and the causes important to us.

WRITING INSPIRATION

Hannah's trip also inspired her latest book, *Little Alf's Adventures Around the World*. Hannah visited Thiba Primary School and met children involved in our Donkey Care Clubs. The project encourages children to think about animal welfare from a young age and go home and share what they've learnt with their parents.

Hannah Russell's latest book in her children's series, *Little Alf's Adventures Around the World*, was inspired by experiencing our work in Kenya. It's available to buy for £8.99 with at least £3 from every copy donated to Brooke to help working horses, donkeys and mules.

HOW YOUR SUPPORT HELPS WORKING DONKEY OWNERS LIKE BERNARD

After continual struggles, hardship and anguish caused by his donkeys being stolen for the donkey skin trade, Bernard has found security and happiness for his family and his animals. And it's all thanks to support like yours.



When we first visited Bernard in 2019, six of his donkeys had been stolen and killed over the previous years, negatively impacting his livelihood and wellbeing.

Bernard remembers spending the day searching for two donkeys only to discover their remains. He says, "The kids were crying in the house and I was not able to hold it together. I just cried before them. It was very painful."

Over the years, Bernard would claw back income only for more donkeys to be stolen and slaughtered. It led to him sacrificing comforts like electricity so he could live with his remaining two donkeys, Kairetu and Kijana, in a more secure compound. Despite these challenges, he continued to work, using all his earnings to care for his family, hoping for a better future for himself and his donkeys.





What a change four years make. Through training and other crucial support from Farming Systems Kenya, and Brooke East Africa – which you help provide – Bernard has relocated to a new home with more space for his donkeys. The compound he lives in is a gated area with a round-the-clock guard.

And there's extra security from Bernard's dogs Pokie and Bruno, too, who he says, "bark if anyone comes near the donkeys!"

Bernard takes great pleasure in giving his donkeys affectionate names. And now there are three as Kairetu – 'Beautiful girl' – gave birth to Kalady since we last visited. It's clear Bernard has a great relationship with all three donkeys, who follow him everywhere he goes, nuzzle him when he's close and respond enthusiastically to their names.

Bernard has also saved enough money to expand his farm with goats and poultry.

"I am so much happier now I have this space. I am hopeful for the future and much more optimistic."

SUPPORTING EQUIDS IN PAKISTAN FLOODS

Pakistan's animal population was hit dramatically by 2022's devastating floods. More than one million livestock animals, whose owners rely on them for their livelihoods, perished. Your support helped set up mobile clinics for sick and injured animals, with Brooke-trained vets.



THE CRUCIAL ACTIONS TAKEN



Provided relief to over **36,000** animals and just under **26,000** people.



Built **88** shelters for displaced equineowning communities.



Distributed over **130** first aid kits.



Performed emergency treatment on almost **30,000** animals including over **8,000** horses, donkeys and mules.



Constructed **60** water pumps and **200** water troughs for access to safe drinking water.

ANNUAL MIGRATION TO THE MOUNTAINS

The Bhotia tribe, the largest equine-owning community in India's Uttarakhand region, relies on seasonal grazing for its economy. For half the year, they live at around 12,000 feet in the Himalayan Mountains with little or no access to essential veterinary care, so Brooke India stepped in to provide health camps.



"With health camps on the way, we ensure equine wellbeing. The tribe is equipped with resources and treatment methods so they can offer better care to their equines during times of sickness or emergency."

EQUINES EMPOWER WOMEN AND GIRLS

Women and girls walk long distances to fetch water in many of the world's communities. But donkeys and mules can transport more water across large distances, freeing up women and girls for education and more.

In March 2023, Brooke and partners hosted a virtual event for the UN 2023 Water Conference. International speakers discussed women and equids' crucial role in water projects.



Rope-making at Olbak Donkey Care Club

Sisal rope makes good-quality tethering ropes and harnesses – essential kit for working horses, donkeys and mules.

Tumaini is head girl at her school. She has three donkeys at home and is part of the Donkey Care Club, which weaves rope to sell wholesale. They use the money they make to buy pens and pencils for their fellow pupils.

Tumaini, who loves donkeys, says, "If anyone is not taking care of the donkey, I advise them that a donkey has many advantages and when we mistreat donkeys they suffer stress, hunger, thirst and malnourishment."

Bebe, a teacher at Olbak Primary School also involved in the club, says, "Our community rears livestock and they use rope, which made us realise there was a market for it."

She adds the students are dedicated to advocating for animal rights. "They scold villagers who abuse them. They stop them from overloading – there is a very big change."

HOW SISAL ROPE IS MADE:

- The leaves are cut from an agave plant grown in nearby fields.
- 2. They strip the leaves on a cow rib bone and split into strands, separating the fibre strands from the pulp.
- They harvest the growing stem, hacking off the sharp point at the end and using the rest of the leaf. Sometimes they use the tip as a sewing needle with 'thread' already attached.
- 4. They take their threads and plait them together to make a rope.



World-class support

UN acknowledges working animals' role in sustainable planet

Brooke has long advocated for including working animals and animal welfare in UN policy, so we're delighted to announce the United Nations General Assembly's groundbreaking resolution.

The resolution urges member states to protect the health and lives of working animals as part of efforts to achieve the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development. It specifically mentions horses, donkeys and mules. This formal acknowledgment of equines' contribution to achieving a sustainable planet is an important step forward for working animals everywhere.

The resolution also highlights the importance of a One Health approach, which focuses on developing programmes, policies and legislation with human and animal health and the environment working together to achieve better public health.

Working equids are essential to the livelihoods of millions of people and play a key role in their access to food and water and in agricultural work.



Anna Marry, Senior External Affairs Adviser at Brooke, says, "We're happy to see these important policy developments and proud to have contributed to them through our advocacy efforts both at the UN and national level."

"When I delivered my daughter, I was able to pay for the Statutory National Health Insurance Fund through money earned by my donkey, which catered for all the delivery fees. My child eats, dresses and lives off income from my donkey."

Donkey skin trade – update



The Pan-African Donkey Conference held in Dar es Salaam, Tanzania in December 2022 was a lifesaver for

the donkey population in Africa, which had been declining due to the donkey skin trade.

Since the signing of the declaration, supporters across Africa have been working tirelessly to make this commitment a reality.

The African Union has endorsed the report **Donkeys in Africa now and in the future**, which Brooke contributed to, agreeing a continental ban on the donkey skin trade is urgently needed to protect declining donkey populations across Africa.

The ban is due to be voted on in February 2024 when the report's recommendations are put forward to the Assembly of Heads of State and Government. We will update you when this new piece of legislation takes effect.
