

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Donkey skin trade: update

In June 2025, the second Pan African Donkey Conference takes place. The first, in 2022, led to the Africa-wide ban on the donkey skin trade that we celebrated in 2024. This time, the conference, organised by the African Union and supported by Brooke, will focus on helping countries to implement the ban. A further aim is showing policymakers in Africa how important donkeys are to livelihoods and development.

A fresh start

In Kenya, our teams are springing into action to help donkeys who have been illegally traded then rescued by the police. We're working with our partners to make sure the donkeys are fit, healthy and microchipped before rehoming them.

Sadly, we don't know the identity of the donkeys' original owners but their new owners have often been the victims of donkey theft themselves.



Brooke wins again!

We've earned a second plaudit at the Smiley Charity Film Awards with a people's choice award for our film, *Brooke at 90.* Voiced by actor and Brooke celebrity supporter Annette Badland, the film was made to commemorate our 90th anniversary in 2024.

Brooke at 90 features archive and present-day footage showcasing our journey and the far-reaching legacy of our founder, Dorothy Brooke. The winner was the film with the most votes, so big thanks to all who voted.

Working with horses by the sea

Horses play a crucial role in the Kutch district in western India, transporting fish around the coastal villages. Standing in the sea, they are loaded with fish from the boat, caught by the men of the village, then carry the bags to the shore. Before, the women used to carry the fish in baskets on their heads, so the horses have now freed them up for other work.

The communities live at the beach for up to nine months during the fishing season before returning home, the men working as fishermen and the women taking care of the animals.

Improving horse welfare

Before we started working with the community by the sea, it lacked access to water and electricity. This meant horses had to travel 5km every day, attached to a cart, to fetch water. We were able to connect the community to government schemes which provided electricity and water and reduced the distances horses and people travel.

While the community are careful not to overload their horses, we did encounter poor harnessing.

One of our Brooke India vets, Dr Anita, suggested replacing the old canvas material with softer, more durable synthetic fabric. This is lighter, withstands salt water better and helps prevent wounds.

Training to be an Ashwasakhi

We trained village member Safura to be an Ashwasakhi, covering horse care, dietary needs and how to administer medication.

Safura explains why she wanted to learn to care for the horses: "We had no knowledge. Everyone was worried that he was suffering. When the horse fell sick, everyone felt sick."

Following her training, Safura gained confidence in treating horses. She now holds one-on-one sessions with members of her community, teaching them how to look after their animals and treat illness.

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Brooke India has provided many benefits. Our horses are healthy. We have received proper knowledge and now, when a horse is sick, we know how to administer medicine so they can recover. Now, horses don't fall ill frequently."

Estrella's road to recovery

In late 2023, we held a veterinary care day with the Nicaraguan Institute of Agricultural Protection and Animal Health at one of their mobile clinics in Santa Teresa, Masaya, Nicaragua. Here, we met Estrella, a fiveyear-old mare and her owner Juan.

Estrella was in a critical condition — she had multiple injuries including visible wounds on her nose, back, spine and shoulder blade. She was very skinny and her ribs were showing.



We recognised the need for intervention and, with Juan, committed to improving Estrella's health, working closely together.



A way forward

We implemented a treatment plan that included wound care, nutritional support and rehabilitation exercises.

We then set about providing support and advice that Juan could use to keep Estrella in the long term. He faced personal issues that were rooted in poverty, and the team were able to help him address these.

Harnessing tips

The team in Nicaragua also sought advice from Jackie Hickman, Brooke Global Harness Adviser, who you may remember reading about in the summer 2024 edition of *Hoof Print*. Jackie shared several pictures, showing how to improve Estrella's harness system.

When the team caught up with Juan in 2024, they worked with him to replace Estrella's cart with a smaller one. They also made sure her harness was well fitted, reducing the risk of further injury, assuring her comfort and making the best use of the harness and cart.

Juan also built Estrella a tarpaulin shelter to shield her from the sun and rain, ensuring she is safe and comfortable.

Estrella's future

The new diet improved Estrella's energy levels and body condition. Regular check-ups allowed us to monitor her healing process and, with improved care, Estrella became more active. Before long, she was able to do light work again.

Due to this work together, Juan now understands Estella's needs. With Juan's continuing commitment to Estrella's welfare, his horse is thriving.

Working with Juan in this way helped us empower him to care for Estrella – not just as a source of income but as a living being who deserves a good life.

A key moment came when we encouraged Juan to visualise Estrella's recovery. He drew a picture of Estrella as she was then and how he thought she'd look in three months' time, and wrote down steps of action.


Working with young people and donkeys

In many urban areas of Kenya, communities involved in commercial donkey work, particularly young people, face a number of social challenges. These include low self-esteem, stigma around their work, poor interpersonal relationships and stress. This not only affects how they feel about themselves but how they treat their donkeys.

With our training partner, Lifeskills Promoters, we worked with two groups of young people in Kenya to improve both their lives and that of their donkeys.

Problems with perception

Before we started working with the groups in Kiserian and Githungiri, the young people told us about the problems they faced.



For example, some people in their communities despised them for their jobs with the donkeys, thinking the work was lesser than other roles.

Charles, a young donkey owner from Kiserian explains, "We used to believe people working with donkeys were unwanted, and that working with donkeys was not a respectable job."

This led to problems in how many of the young people perceived themselves and how they responded to their animals.

James, also from Kiserian, admits, "Before meeting Brooke East Africa and Lifeskills Promoters, I'd mistreat my donkeys when I couldn't handle my emotions."

Some of the young people also had issues around drug and alcohol abuse, and others struggled with personal hygiene.

A new way of thinking

Thanks to support like yours, we were able to step in with our partner and train 40 young people on essential life skills and donkey welfare.




After I was taught about stress management, how to communicate with people, financial literacy and donkey welfare, I'm leading a better life, treating my donkeys better, and saving up for a motorbike to grow my business."

Through this training, the donkeys' welfare has vastly improved, alongside young people's self-esteem, interpersonal relationships and skills around saving money.

He ensured our programmes remained relevant, efficient and effective, grounded in strong evidence and committed to continuous accountability and improvement.

He also carried out independent evaluations of our projects in Nicaragua, Ethiopia, Nepal, and Pakistan, which included our work in the brick kilns.

César's dedication to working animals was evident in all he did. We are so grateful for César's crucial contribution, expertise and commitment and will miss him greatly.

A colleague remembers César

I had the privilege of working with César since 2016, and over the years came to admire him deeply – not just for his technical brilliance and work ethic, but for his humility, kindness, and quiet strength.

In December 2019, I had the special honour of hosting him during his visit to Pakistan. His warmth, openness, and genuine curiosity made a deep impression on everyone he met here.

César played a vital role in Brooke Pakistan's growth and systems. He was always there, behind the scenes, offering advice, encouragement, and support that made all the difference.

Though he is no longer with us, his legacy continues. His values – humility, excellence, service – are woven into the fabric of our work. We remember him not just as a colleague, but as a dear friend whose presence enriched our lives.

Nutrition is key

The right nutrition is so important for working horses, donkeys and mules, helping them keep strong, nourished and energised. It also enables communities to thrive thanks to the animals' improved health and capabilities. Support like yours means we can be there for working animals with nutritional advice for their owners that benefits the whole community.

Balanced feed

A balanced feed unit is where maize, rice bran, Indian bengal gram and minerals are mixed together, then bagged up and sold by equine welfare groups. Working animals get the food they need and their owners add to their livelihoods

Azolla pits



Azolla is a green fodder rich in vitamins and minerals that's beneficial to donkeys.

Because owners' income can be unpredictable, they struggle to buy Azolla consistently for their animals. We help owners build their own Azolla pits to provide a sustainable food source.

We also run sessions on keeping animals hydrated. Azolla helps with this too being 80–90% water.

Dakshaben's story

Before Dakshaben realised the importance of a proper, balanced diet, her donkeys, who work in the brick kiln, often looked gaunt and tired easily. Within months of our setting up a balanced feed unit in Sundalpura, India, Dakshaben saw a huge difference in her donkeys' health, with shinier coats and increased energy.



Balanced feed is now a permanent part of their diet, which they eagerly eat after a day's work while Dakshaben brushes their coats. She feels confident she's giving her donkeys the best care possible.
