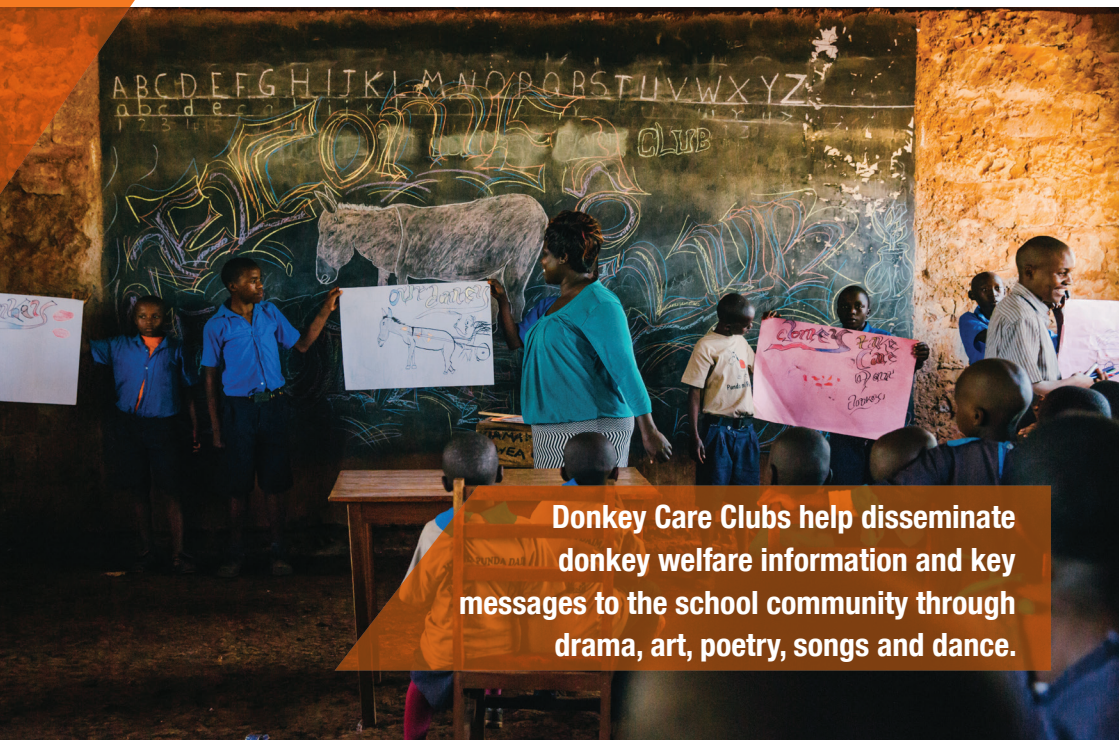
How does School- to-School linking work?

"My name is Muria and I love donkeys. I wake up every morning at 4am to let my donkeys out. I feed them and give them water so that they are ready for their working day. They carry water for my family and transport vegetables to market for us to sell. They help us to make money so that we can buy food and my parents can send me to school.

Schools starts at 6.45am and my favourite lesson happens at 3pm every Wednesday - Donkey Care Club. We learn about the 5 freedoms for working equines*, we make up songs and poems about sad and happy donkeys and we draw pictures about donkey welfare. We sing songs for our friends and family so they can learn too.

I wish Donkey Care Club could last all day, but I must go home to do my homework and put my donkeys to bed."
